The Old Bristol Historical Society Elects Two New Directors

The Old Bristol Historical Society is pleased to announce the July 22nd election of Jay Crooker and Joyce Prior Thompson to its Board of Directors.

Jay Crooker moved to Maine four years ago with his wife and two young sons, restoring a farmhouse in Bristol that has been in his family for five generations. His fourth-great grandfather, Captain Elijah Crooker, settled in Bristol after the Revolutionary War. Jay is the new secretary of the OBHS and is also the secretary of the Bristol Village Improvement Society in Bristol Mills. He will be serving as the administrator of the society's new web site. While obtaining a graduate degree in chemistry from the University of North Carolina, Crooker launched his internet business which licenses specialized training software to coaches of distance runners. More recently he started a photo organizing and scanning service after digitizing his family's photographs.

Joyce Thompson grew up in Bristol Mills and is employed as office manager for Ronald Pendleton Inc. Plumbing & Heating in New Harbor. She is former secretary-treasurer of local Bristol charity, Caring for Kids. She was also treasurer of the Congregational Church of Bristol for ten years and has been a long-serving member of its fund-raising and other committees. She and her husband, Edgar, operate two businesses out of their home in Pemaquid Falls; Embroidery for All Seasons and Reasons, and Pemaquid Vinyl Lettering and Signs in New Harbor. Joyce has already joined in helping the society with its fund-raising activities.

New Logo for the Old Bristol Historical Society

This past spring OBHS unveiled its new logo! The design prominently features an image of the three masted schooner, the H.H. Chamberlain, which not only represents Bristol's connection to the sea, but also has

its own interesting story to tell. Built in Phippsburg in 1891, the Chamberlain was loaded and moored off Pemaguid Beach when the infamous Portland Gale of November 1898 struck. Crewman Alexander "Pug" McLain and another crew member had been left on board to tend the ship, but when it started dragging its mooring, word was sent to Captain Warren Fossett to hurry back from his home in Round Pond. Cutting the line, Captain Fossett and three crew members hoped to get to Boothbay's more protected harbor, but instead ended up being blown out to sea about 160 miles off Nantucket! As days passed and word began to spread of the approximately 150 vessels and 400 souls lost in the storm, the



Chamberlain and its crew were presumed lost. Imagine the joy and relief when word came 8 days later that the Chamberlain and its crew were safe in Nantucket! It's said that they delivered their cargo of pogy oil and machinery before returning home two weeks after their ordeal began.

Digital Image Archive News

For those of you who are interested in the OBHS Digital Image Archive, we have exciting news to share! OBHS has recently purchased PastPerfect, a museum collections management software. PastPerfect allows for the creation of records which will enable users to search for images in a variety of ways including by subject, names, dates, keywords and advanced searches using a combination of fields simultaneously. Our copresident Chuck Rand has already begun the work of entering data on each image into the program, which is bringing us closer to our goal of creating a searchable database of images available to the public. For more information, we invite you to attend our up-coming winter lecture on February 17 entitled "Searching Bristol's Past: a demonstration of the PastPerfect software."

We're also pleased to report that the archive continued to grow this year with the addition of 403 new images, bringing the total number of images found in our archive to 2598. Of the new images added, 157 were through donation (described above in new accessions), while 246 images (described below) were "shared" by participants. A Medal for a Local Resident

Perhaps few in the Bristol Area, other than the descendants of the people involved in this story, know that a silver Carnegie Medal was awarded to a resident of the town of Bristol.

It was more than 110 years ago on November 23, 1907 when Lincoln J. Partridge, his older brother Fred, and George D. Tarr were working at a sawmill located on a stream, off the road at Pemaquid Beach that is now named The Trail when a heart-breaking accident occurred.

The two Partridge brothers were feeding wood into a circular saw with a 3-foot diameter blade from which Tarr, aged 62, was removing the sawn wood. Suddenly Tarr's coat and shirt became entangled in the saw. Seeing the life of his co-worker endangered,



Lincoln Partridge reached from the other side of the mechanism to grab him but unfortunately fell and was injured by the saw before thrown free; he died within minutes of the accident. Partridge was 42 years old and the father of five children.

In addition to receiving the Carnegie Medal awarded posthumously to Partridge about a year later, his widow, Emma (Wallace) Partridge, was given a monthly grant by the

institution for herself and the children, Sadie, James, Tina, Wallace, and Doris, until her death in 1925. This grant, according to the late Betty Partridge Prescott, the granddaughter of awardee, Lincoln Partridge, helped the family barely get through its hardships of daily living following this tragic accident.



Note: Lincoln J. Partridge is also the ancestor of the Reilly family currently of the area. George D. Tarr was the brother of Samuel F. Tarr, the Civil War veteran, about whom an article appeared in the Spring issue of the 2016 OBHS Newsletter.
