Memories and Musings on a Maine Heritage and the Pemaquid Group of Artists By Jane Bowman

Growing up in a family of artists and coming to Maine every summer from Massachusetts furnished me with wonderful memories of Pemaquid. The strongest of my Pemaquid recollections began the summer of August 1945, V-J Day, World War II. My parents, Donald and Betty Bowman, had bought an old salt water farmhouse on a cove in New Harbor and we were in it. This was to be our summer place. We joined our new neighbors next door at Hillcrest Farm, then a boarding house for summer folk as well as a small farm, cheering and banging on pots and pans, celebrating war's end. Everything, at that time, seemed upbeat. New beginnings were settling over the USA.

The following musings are not meant to be definite in dates or descriptions. They are just memorable thoughts, I wanted to write about, record to share and keep for reminiscing on from time to time. Both of my grandfathers, a Bowman from Maine and a Jeffrey from Massachusetts, were born with artistic talent. They passed this on to my parents, to my cousin, Bill, and to me. I feel blessed with this gift.

Imaginative adventures - drawing, painting in all different types of mediums and those "pleine aire" family excursions on the Bristol rocks and shores were always cherished life experiences for me, even as a youngster. So, too, were visits to museums and galleries, seeing the work of the great Masters, important current art of the time and artwork of my family entered into exhibitions. Such experiences provided me with warm memories of one gallery, the one the family felt closest to---being practically a next door neighbor and part of our community---the Pemaquid Group of Artists.

Getting acquainted with the Pemaquid Group probably began for me in the early 1950's, although I know that the group had formed back in the 1920's---1928, according to an Internet history clip. In this Post War-time, when Americans sought out summering in second homes, this group was becoming part of the ambiance of the Pemaquid peninsula, providing professionally created art by residents from the area. During those early years of the '50's, my family and I supported Pemaquid artists and exhibitions, going to shows held in such disparate locales as the Surf Casino, the old Mavooshen grammar schoolhouse, and the upper floor of the big building across from Reilly's Market, all on New Harbor Hill. At that time the Surf Casino, located in back of the bank in New Harbor, was the most exotic, encompassing all kinds of entertainment: a movie theater, a bowling alley and an ice cream parlor. The bowling alley, as one can imagine, was very precarious for Pemaquid show attendees, as I remember my grandmother Bowman twisting her ankle, trying to view my grandfather's artwork in a show.

The first in my family to become part of this Pemaquid Artist's Group was my grandfather, Milfred Bowman. He was born in New Harbor and, after years of moving his family out of Maine to find work during the major Great Depression period and once again during WWII's years, settled back into his home in New Harbor on the Huddle Road. He began his painting in oils of marine subjects, accomplished in the workshop part of his barn. He exhibited in the period of the 1940's – early 1950's. This was a time when early founders of the Pemaquid group, made up of talented artists such as Simon Blaisdell, Frederick Detwiller, Parker Gamage, Dr. Willliam Harvey and Guy Halley Thompson, were active.

My father, Donald Bowman, an art director in Boston, schooled in fine art but seeking stable employment in advertising, followed my grandfather as a member of the Pemaquid Group. He was known for his creative ability in oils and acrylics, painting the rugged Maine coast, its surf, landscapes, harbor scenes and people.

Then, my mother, Betty Bowman, through her study accomplished with the Famous Artists' School in Westport, CT, brought her talents in skillful rendering of watercolor to the Pemaquid Group as a member at a later time. Still later I was pleased to have been chosen as Guest Artist and Seasonal Guest Artist in 2011 and 2012, carrying on the tradition of Bowman support of the Pemaquid Group of Artists.

My father greatly enjoyed devoting his talent and time to the Pemaquid Group, becoming President for a period during the 1970's - 1980's. He took over the position after Gene Klebe, a noted artist and visionary for the gallery's growth. Klebe, along with the help of my father, was instrumental in working to get permission to build a structure, plan its design and establish a new gallery. The location decided on was not only a Town of Bristol Park with its lighthouse, but also federal land housing the US Coast Guard. Alfred and Priscilla Dalmas, devoted patrons of the group, were also very important in their strong support as were the artists of the group and the Town of Bristol. The gallery found its site in 1960. A new building was constructed at Lighthouse Park at Pemaquid Point, its current home.

Throughout those many years from the 1950's on into the 1990's, the Bowman family truly enjoyed the venue and opportunity of exhibiting their artwork on our beautiful Maine coast, making friends and working with this vibrant talented group, still so much a part of the Pemaquid community.

Jane Bowman moved to New Harbor permanently in May, 2005 from Massachusetts. She lives and paints at the salt water farm inherited from her parents, who had become full time residents of Bristol in 1979. Editor's note: The OBHS appreciates Jane's article and would heartily welcome other person's memories from the past.

The Digital Images Archive

The OBHS Digital Images Archive continues to grow. This past February Co-Presidents Chuck Rand and



Belinda Osier gave a presentation which featured over a hundred images out of the approximately 2000 images already in the Archive and outlined the Society's ambitious plans for the Archive's future which include an online presence. In the meantime, we continue to accept donations to our collection and, of equal importance, to scan, digitize and return items that people wish to "share" but not donate. You can currently view images from the **Digital Images** Archive on our Facebook page which

now has over 950 followers. So far this year OBHS has acquired a wonderful collection of Footlighters' photos along with associated programs that was kept by the late Leona Brackett (a long-time participant in the shows), and generously donated by her daughter Sherrill Brackett Callahan. We are also very grateful to Carol Baker Joyal who has given us the opportunity to scan family photographs of people and landscapes associated with the former Windemere Hotel that was located in Pemaquid Harbor. Carol is the granddaughter of Fred and Mary

Baker who ran the hotel between 1910 and 1935 before it was destroyed by fire. We also have a small but growing list of names of people who have photographs they are willing to "share." If you would like to be put on that list or have items that you would like to donate, please contact OBHS.
